A man by the name of H. A. Ironside summarized the paradox about fate

versus free will graphically without the benefit of modern physics. He described our opportunity for salvation as a door. He said it is as if he is walking down a hall, and he comes to a door in the wall. Over the door it says "Whosoever will may enter." He looks at that door, and he can either go in or not go in. It is his choice. He makes a decision, and he opens the door and walks through.

On the other side, he finds a banquet hall with a feast sumptuously laid out. He walks around the tables, and he finds name cards at every place setting. After looking over the names, he is startled to find a place setting with his name on the card. He is astounded to learn that he was expected. How did they know he was coming? He could have chosen not to open the door he just came through. On the other side, remember, it had said, "Whosoever will may enter." However, he sees that on this side the door is labeled, "Foreordained before the foundation of the world."

This is not The Twilight Zone. This is the paradox that is explained because God knows the end from the beginning. We have choices to make, but God already knows what those choices will be. He is known from the beginning who are His – the ones who will be with Him in eternity. From our side of the door, we have a chance to open the door or not. From His side of the door, we were foreordained from the beginning of time.

Human Software

Imagine a personal computer. Imagine we know everything that is to know about every circuit, every wire, every part of that hardware. Would that tell us anything about its behavior? Absolutely not, because the hardware is simply a residence for something else called software. The software determines which programs the computer runs. The hardware is the engine that gives the software the ability to run the programs it needs to run.

We can put software on CDs or on thumb drives. These days we download software over the internet. Suppose I have a blank thumb drive and a sensitive postal sale. Let us say I put the thumb drive on the postal scale, and it weighs exactly one ounce. Then, let us say I load software with 10 GB worth of digital pictures and videos. When I put the thumb drive back on the postal scale, it will still weigh exactly one ounce. Why? Software has no mass. Its embodiment at some instant may reflect mass, but it has no mass. I can sit in a coffee shop and use their WIFI, and I can send information through the air. It travels up into space, hits satellited, and bounces back.

If I look at a crowd of people, I cannot see the software, the true essence of those people. I can see the temporary residences they are dwelling in, but I cannot see the real them. The real us is software, not hardware. This shell we are living in is a temporary hard drive.

I had an interesting experience a few years back. I had a rigorous schedule back then, and I did a lot of writing, even then. I was very dependent on my laptop because it allowed me to write while I traveled. After a few years of hard use, my laptop finally died. I took it to the shop to get fixed, but it had booted up for the last time. I was in trouble, because I depended on my laptop, and I could not afford a new one. Some friends of my wife, in the computer field, were talking with my wife and she brought up the issue to see if any of them might know wat we could do. It ended up that one of the guys in this group told my wife that he had some laptops that had just been upgraded and he not only gave us one but three newly upgraded computers. I was more grateful for this than I can tell you.

I will never forget the day that I unpacked it and fired it up. I started loading it with all the software that I had collected – 25 years of tools – and I was back in business on familiar terms. All the files I was used to were there for me again, except that they ran about a hundred times faster.

That experience left an impression on me, and it hit me with a realization: we are all heading for an upgrade. Software has no mass. The real us has no mass (spiritual). This means that software is not affected by time. One day we are going to junk our old hardware (physical), but the part that is eternal will be transferred.

You and I are eternal, whether we like it or not. That is good news for those who are saved, but it is terrible news if we are not. As human beings we face the prospect of two deaths, not just one. We are all familiar with the first death, but that is not the death that should concern us. The second death is the one that is everything and terrifying.

Resurrection

We all know about DNA, the code for life. When an egg is fertilized, it becomes a zygote and goes through mitosis, splitting and growing, splitting and growing. The two cells become four, and the four cells become eight. After a little while something fascinating happens. The cells begin to differentiate into different body parts. Pretty soon we see the line that will become the backbone grow down the middle. Some cells become bone tissue, and some become heart muscle. Each new cell starts taking its role necessary for an entire body to develop. This is staggering considering the fact that the exact same DNA reproduces in each cell during mitosis. Identical strands of DNA are created over and over again, yet certain sections are expressed in one set of cells while other sections are expressed in other sets as the body forms the lungs, kidneys, and eyes. It is all preprogrammed, and it is quite amazing.

Salvation

Walter Martin used to irreverently say that there are two ways to get to Heaven. Plan A and Plan B:

- ➤ PLAN A "You never screw up from the time of your accountability onwards. You never make a mistake." Whether we are tired or stressed out, whether people are unkind to us and treat us unjustly, we simply go through all the contingencies of life without ever doing anything wrong. If we are successful, then we can march right through the pearly gates of Heaven, walk-up to God and say, "Hello. Please more over. Now there is two of us."
- ➤ PLAN B "Accept your pre-paid ticket." In plan B e embrace God's willingness to impure the righteousness of Jesus Christ to us.

Which one is actually possible? This was Walter's way of making his point. Unless we live in a world of self-delusion, we recognize that Plan A is exceptionally impossible, and only one man has ever done it. The rest of us do not get through life without errors. John and Paul both said it well for us:

Those who have accepted the redemption that God has provided are in for some real excitement. It is going to be tremendous fun, because we are going to be joint heirs with Him. We have no ability to grasp the joy that will be involved in joining with Christ in the eternal work He is doing.
